


South Carolina Ethics: The Wild West?

- South Carolina Ethics, Government Accountability, and Campaign Reform Act of 1991
- Applies to public officials, public members, and public employees
- South Carolina Ethics Commission
 - 8 members: 2 appointed by Senate, 2 appointed by House, 4 appointed by Governor
 - 5-year terms
- Advisory Opinions
 - Formal v. Informal



Complaints & Investigations

- Anyone can file an ethics complaint
 - Anonymous complaints can't be filed, but information therein can be investigated
 - Groundless complaints
 - 4-year statute of limitations unless discovery deliberately prevented
- Verified complaint; within 10 days a copy is sent to respondent
- Illegal to contact any member of the Commission during pendency of a complaint; can communicate with Commission staff
- At the conclusion of the investigation, a recommendation is made as to whether probable cause exists to believe a violation has occurred
 - Probable cause allegations in the complaint are more likely than not to have occurred and constitute a violation
- Commission may waive further proceedings if respondent takes action to remedy or correct the alleged violation




What disciplinary actions can be taken?

- If found guilty of an alleged violation, the Commission may:
 - Recommend administrative action or disciplinary action
 - Issue a public warning or reprimand
 - Order restitution
 - Levy a civil penalty of not more than \$2,000 per violation
- Any criminal activity is subject to prosecution by the Attorney General's Office:
 - If found guilty of a violation, the respondent is guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, imprisonment for not more than 1 year, or both
 - Bribery is a felony and carries the penalty of a \$10,000 fine, 10 years in prison, or both

Campaigning at O.K. Corral

Board member Wyatt Earp arrives at O.K. Corral Elementary School to pick up his son. While in the office, he gets the school secretary to fax his campaign flyer over to Office Depot so he can get copies made.


Earp also requests that the secretary place a stack of informational flyers in the office about an upcoming candidate forum taking place at O.K. Corral Community Center.

Finally, Earp asks to use the administrative conference room for a campaign committee meeting.

Has Earp violated the Ethics Act?


A teacher at O.K. Corral Elementary is a volunteer with board member Earp's campaign for reelection to the school board. She uses her Gmail account to send a campaign flyer to some of her coworkers on their district email accounts. These coworkers have attended campaign events and are registered as campaign volunteers for board member Earp. She knows they support him in the upcoming election.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?




In an election campaign, board members may not use:

S.C. Code Ann. § 8-13-765





SC Ethics Advisory Opinion 2003-003 "A person knowingly sending an e-mail which contains campaign material to a public employee on his government computer is in violation of the Ethics Reform Act."



Prospecting for Pecos

Board Member Doc Holliday is a huge supporter of S.C. Senate Candidate Pecos Bill. He has several different "Vote for Pecos" stickers on the personal vehicle he drives to board meetings and district events.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Holliday decides his campaign stickers aren't getting enough attention, so he gets his entire vehicle "wrapped" with "Vote for Pecos" messaging.


Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Holliday tells Candidate Pecos he is allowed to pass out campaign materials during a theatre class production at 7 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Holliday invites Candidate Pecos and his opponent to come speak at a district assembly. Pecos agrees to come, but his opponent declines to attend.

Can the assembly be held?





PREDOMINANT PURPOSE TEST

SC Ethics Advisory Opinion 2006-001


Educational (i.e. school day)

Predominant purpose of public school property during the school day is public education of children

Entertainment

(i.e. football game)

General public is invited and predominant purpose is to provide entertainment



Corralling Campaign Accounts

Board member Annie Oakley is traveling to a campaign event and uses her campaign account to purchase gasoline.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Board member Buffalo Bill is relieved he hasn't had any campaign spending since the election last November. In fact, he only has twelve cents in his account. He filed his pre-election campaign disclosure, and he hasn't filed any additional reports since.

Has Buffalo Bill violated the Ethics Act?

Board member Frank Butler is up for reelection and is unsure how to file his pre-election campaign disclosure report. The board secretary helps him complete this required filing.

What implications does this have for the district?

Campaign Funds



All expenditures Spending must come from your campaign account! Campaign

S.C. Code Ann. § 8-13-1348 has more detail on receipts, petty cash, etc.

You can only use campaign funds to run for another office if you write a letter to ALL donors and get their WRITTEN permission!

Fines Campaign funds CANNOT be used to pay fines to the Ethics Commission! March 2019 **Advisory Opinion**



Filing Candidate Campaign Disclosures




within 10 days after spending or receiving the first Initial \$500 of campaign funds, including your personal funds

Report Pre-Election campaign activity or not

January 10 **Quarterly Reports**

- Oct 1 Dec 31
- April 10
- Jan 1 March 31 July 10
- April 1 June 30 October 10
- July 1 Sept 30

Report After the campaign account is closed; Final must be a ZERO balance and no outstanding debts



SEI Stampede

New board member Wild Bill was elected in November and sworn in thereafter. He files his first Statement of Economic Interests on March 28th.


Has Wild Bill violated the Ethics Act?

Board member Jesse James has filed his Statement of Economic Interests. He works full-time for Wild Bunch Construction, so he includes this as his main source of income. Since he only makes \$500 a month as a board member, he doesn't list that on his SEI.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

At the annual SCSBA conference, a local law firm takes the board to dinner. Board member Lone Ranger adds this item to his SEI. Board member Hoss Cartwright thinks that it should not be included.



The Gallop Around Group plans to bestow its annual Community Caregiver award to Board member Highstep in recognition of her service to the education community. The award includes a banquet reception where she will be a featured speaker. A fancy meal will be served, and she will be given a beautiful crystal trophy valued at \$145.


Is accepting this award a violation of the Ethics Act?

Board member Highstep is also a highly sought after speaker on educational issues facing school districts. A school board in North Carolina has asked her to come speak to their district staff. They have offered to pay her travel costs and lodging and to provide her with an additional \$250/day per diem.

Is accepting this speaking engagement a violation of the Ethics Act?

Board member Highstep has another speaking engagement in Greenville that takes place on a Friday afternoon, which coincides with the community's Azalea Festival. Her hosts have told her they will pay for her to keep her hotel room for the duration of the weekend so she can enjoy the festival.

Is accepting this speaking engagement a violation of the Ethics Act?






"Anything of Value" does not include:

Printed or promotional material <\$10 OR available similarly to the public

Plaque or trophy <\$150

Honorary degrees

Campaign contributions made in accordance with the SC Ethics Act




Catering Cahoots

Board member Butch Cassidy's cousin Roy owns a one-man catering company in the district. Roy's Catering is willing to give the board a 50% discount when catering special meetings and work sessions. Board member Cassidy tells the board about this amazing deal. It turns out this is the cheapest catering available to the board by far, and the board contracts with the company.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Roy's seventeen-year-old daughter, Kitty Cassidy, automatically gets 25% of all profits from Roy's Catering. Kitty came to live with board member Cassidy in January of 2018, and he provides all of her care. Board member Cassidy will be claiming Kitty as a dependent on his 2018 tax return.

Does this change your answer?



A board member cannot knowingly:

Use his office to obtain an economic interest for himself, a family member, or an individual or business with which he is associated

S.C. Code Ann. § 8-13-700



Influence a governmental decision in which he, a family member, or an individual or business with which he is associated has an economic interest



Recusal Procedure


When there is advance notice, prepare a <u>written statement</u> describing the matter requiring action and the nature of the potential conflict

Give a copy to the presiding officer who will have the statement printed in the minutes

During the meeting, the presiding officer will require the member to be excused from any VOTES, DELIBERATIONS, or OTHER ACTIONS on the matter

Presiding officer will ensure the disqualification and the cause are noted in the minutes

S.C. Code Ann. § 8-13-700(B)(1),(4)



Oversharing Outlaw

Board member Outlaw has requested to view the complete application file of the superintendent's choice for the district's new human resources director. His wife is a HR director in a neighboring district, and he is curious as to what qualifications the applicants hold that are warranting the massive salary increase the superintendent is requesting.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Board member Outlaw's sister-in-law is starting an alternative charter school for students who have been removed from the local school district for behavioral issues. Outlaw knows how important it is that at-risk students continue their education, so he sends his sister-in-law a list of the students he can recall from memory that have been expelled this school year hoping they may enroll.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?


Confidentiality Restrictions

S.C. Code Ann. § 8-13-725



A board member may not use or disclose confidential information gained in the course of or by reason of his official responsibilities in a way that would affect an economic interest held by him, a member of his immediate family, an individual with whom he is associated, or a business with which he is associated.


A board member may not willfully examine, or aid and abet in the willful examination of, records of an individual in possession of within the access of the district is the purpose of the examination is improper or unlawful.



"Official Responsibility" means:



 Direct administrative or operating authority whether intermediate or final, and whether exercisable personally or through subordinates, to approve, disapprove, or otherwise direct government action



"Official Capacity" includes activities which:




Arise because of the board member's position



 Involve matters which fall within the official responsibility of the board member



 Services for which the district would normally reimburse the board member



Bond Referendum in Dodge City

Board member Lucas McCain wants to make sure the parents of his district are knowledgeable about an upcoming school bond referendum and drafts a neutral, informational Facebook post about the measure and shares it on his public page. He also changes his profile picture to a "Vote Yes" logo.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?

Board member McCain tells Superintendent Kid to require district staff to offer students extra credit if they pass out "Vote Yes" stickers to their relatives.

Is this a violation of the Ethics Act?




Ballot Measure

Questions or issues on which VOTERS can cast a vote



Non-Ballot Measure

Questions or issues on which only members of the GENERAL ASSEMBLY can vote



Board Members Can

-Describe


- -Explain rationale
- -Answer questions
- -Develop and distribute facts
- -Remind public to vote



Board Members Cannot

- -Have staff promote or advocate during "the school day"
- -Have staff display signs or materials
- -Use district resources to print, copy, email, or mail materials advocating for a position
- -Hold rallies on district property
- -Use students to advocate
