
# HCS State Report Card & AP District Honor Roll



## 2013 State Report Card



- 100 percent of Horry County schools earned **Absolute** ratings of Excellent, Good, or Average.
- 90 percent of schools earned
   Growth ratings of Excellent,
   Good, or Average.

### Horry County Schools' District Ratings

- Absolute rating: Good
- Growth rating: Average



### 2013 State Report Card

### Among 50 schools:

- 28 schools earned an Excellent Absolute rating
- 16 schools earned an Excellent Growth rating

- 11 schools earned a Good Absolute rating
- 12 schools earned a Good Growth rating
- 15 schools earned both Excellent Absolute and Growth ratings



### 2013 State Report Card

- The District's 2013 State Report Card indicates...
- an improved graduation rate;
- an increase in the number of students passing and scoring at higher levels on state assessments;
- gains made on college entrance exams; and
- an increase in the percentage of expenditures for instruction.



# HCS named to the College Board's 4<sup>th</sup> Annual AP® District Honor Roll

AP Annual AP District Honor Roll

 The AP® District Honor Roll recognizes district's with significant gains in the number of students participating in AP® courses and successfully passing course exams.

 Performance data used for recognition includes the 2010-11, 2011-12, and 2012-13 school years.



### AP District Honor Roll

#### In those three years, HCS experienced:

- a 25 percent increase in the number of students taking AP® courses;
- up to 1,618 students in 2013 from 1,294 students in 2011
- a 28 percent increase in the number of AP® exams administered; and
- up to 2,432 exams in 2013 from 1,900 two years earlier
- a 41 percent increase in the number of students scoring between 3-5.
- up to 1,406 passing scores in 2013 from 1,000 in 2011



### **AP District Honor Roll**

### To be eligible for inclusion, districts were required to increase the level of participation by at least...

- 4 percent in large districts;
- 6 percent in medium districts; and
- 11 percent in small districts.
- While increasing participation, districts were required to:
- maintain minority participation; and
- maintain/increase the percentage of students scoring 3-5
