

<u>Interpretation</u>: I interpret this policy to mean that the District will establish and maintain a safe learning environment that promotes respect, encourages high student achievement, and works collaboratively with parents and other agencies to support students who may be having difficulty with behavioral issues.

Evidence of Status of Compliance:

- Parent-Student Guides were printed for the 2017-18 school year that outlined expected student conduct and sanctions applied in case of disorderly conduct. Parents were given a copy and the guide is posted on the district's website. Each student receives a copy of the policy included in the school's handbook.
- Student hearings are conducted by District Hearing Officers for students who have violated established codes of conduct and appropriate punishments are assigned. (See attachments for HCS's hearings, expulsions, and appeals to the District and to the School Board.)
- Unruly student behavior that disrupts the learning environment is dealt with. (See attachments for high school, middle school, and elementary school data comparisons)
- Numerous meetings and trainings were held with school district administrators to discuss discipline issues, concerns, and procedures.
